1. What skills and experiences qualify you to serve as a Chapter Delegate?

Second, as a profession we must continue to fight diligently towards overall higher reimbursement and general equity in reimbursement across settings. At the same time, as a profession we need to consistently demonstrate efficacy of care through patient outcomes and continued research. Continued declining reimbursement is a significant threat towards the ability of our profession to achieve maximal impact on the health and wellness of our communities.
