1. What experiences would you bring to the position of Director that makes you a strong candidate?

PT authorization requirements. The issue has gained national attention and other states has been successful in passing similar legislation. I feel confident we will be able to do the same. Passing legislation would improve access to PT as well as decrease the time and financial burden placed on patients, PT/PTAs, and PT/PTA employers. We have been successful in moving the legislation forward thus far. By collaborating with APTA at the national level, other state chapters, leveraging our own individual member expertise, our lobbyists, representatives, and patients, we are working to make the legislation a reality.

I also am committed to helping APTA Wisconsin show its members *value* of their membership. Using a needs-based process I hope to help the association identify impactful services and work that will make a difference in the professional lives of our members. I also hope that work extends to current non-members, attracting more to contribute to membership in the future. This will allow the association to grow, become stronger in advocating and advancing the physical therapy profession through the state and beyond.
